Witchcraft Cross-cultural - inborn capacity, propensity to do evil European - redefined as heresy, pact with devil Mixed with sorcery beliefs Witch = the enemy within Witchcraft Cross- culturally Universal belief with similar features Say only legitimate magic - miracles of Christ Redefine Pagan magic as invoking evil spirits
